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EYES SHUT - POCKETBOOKS OPEN

While we revere and pay tribute to the memory of our ancestors for their valiant deeds, their courage and their stand for the right, in defense of our state and our nation, we fail them if we do not also meet with courage and patriotism the dangerous activities now occurring in our very midst. Must we keep our eyes shut and our pocketbooks open to projects fostered under the beautiful names of education and religion, no matter by whom, or how sponsored or run?

If Greensboro citizens are going to be called upon to contribute to the building of colleges in this vicinity we should have a better choice than is now afforded us. Our leaders should more seriously consider the beginning of a real Community College, a new one patterned after those now operating in Asheville, Charlotte and Wilmington. Greensboro College is now operating as a co-educational institution, is located in the heart of the city and might it be the instrument we need to foster and build upon. Womens College of the University might even be developed along lines co-educational and with special emphasis on local needs. We could divorce Greensboro Division of Guilford College and run it independently.

Some will say we already have what we need in Guilford College. I heartily disagree. We do not need them. We need a red-blooded American institution. I have no objection to the Quakers doing their own building, although I disagree heartily with their racial teachings and their attitudes toward the internal and external defense of our beautiful land. Let them be true to their own. Why should the rest of us aid in our own destruction? If everyone else had the same attitude, there would be no Free America today for them to practice their religion and subversive activities. Would you want anyone to discourage your sons from defending their country in the armed services if need be? Or have your children taught by persons, however learned, who believe in inter-marriage of the races and who conscientiously object to service in the armed forces in defense of our country?

Quaker activities have been so unattractive to red-blooded Americans that there has been no noticeable gain in their numbers of members in the twentieth century. It is one of the oldest yet one of the smallest in numbers of all the various denominations in America. Why should we help them put life in what many of the Quakers themselves consider a dying sect? Should we help them spread their anti-American influence?

In 1956 it was again revealed to the public and especially to our patriotic business men the nature of the notorious activities of the discredited American Friends Service Committee right here in Guilford County. What was not so well known was the proud claim of C.S. Feagles, a conscientious objector and associate professor of philosophy at Guilford College, that the college had a very close relationship with American Friends Service Committee and was training its leaders. Guilford College has furnished three chairmen of the AFSC Southeastern Regional Office who are (quote) intimately connected with Guilford College - one as the highest-ranking member of the (college) board of trustees, one as the highest-ranking member of the administration, and one as one of the highest-ranking members of the faculty; one member of the board

trustees is on the administrative staff of the national office of the AFSC in Philadelphia, and actively serving on one of that office's standing committees is the highest-ranking member of the (college) administration; actively serving on three of the Southeastern Regional Office's standing committees are eight men drawn from the college's board of trustees, administration and full-time faculty; at least six other members of the college's board of trustees, administration or full-time faculty have within the recent past worked closely with the AFSC (unquote). So said C. S. Feagins in the Public Pulse columns of the Greensboro Daily News, September 17, 1958.

My point is simply this: Let our Chamber of Commerce, Piedmont Associated Industries, and civic leaders generally, pause and realize what is going on. They should know how many of them are, with their money, supporting people whose adopted rules of conduct are absolutely opposed to the beliefs of their benefactors. We should then see that our fair city gets back of a real community college, whether or not connected with a church. If we decide to help a church college become more of a community affair, let's make it a denomination that more nearly fills the needs and aspirations of our people. Not one that, by long tradition and modern conviction, favors integration and mongrelization of our races, and not one that also opposes the internal and external defense of our nation by refusal to serve in our armed forces in wartime.

They "conscientiously object" to risking their lives for freedom, and teach others to do the same. They are willing for us to fight and die to save Quaker necks. These people also make it a point to bring to our community every year numbers of speakers spreading Socialist, Communist, and other un-American and subversive doctrines. And then ask those of us devoted to free economy to support them with cash. And let's not contribute our money or send our children to school to any denomination or college opposed to the Loyalty Oath or the Oath of Allegiance to our country, or that serves as a training ground for leaders of the American Friends Service Committee.

Why should we bid on the rope to hang ourselves or cooperate in our own destruction, either from the inside or the outside as the Communists keep telling us we would do? Herbert Hoover in a recent speech on subversive movements undermining America, said "The American way of life has proved to be pretty tough. It needs to be tougher now". His advice certainly applies to us here and now. Should we keep our eyes shut and our pocketbooks open? What is this community going to do about it? Shall we remain soft, or have the courage to be tough enough to meet the situation?

Reference is made to the enclosed letter dated 8/8/60 from Stephen Thiermann, executive secretary of the Northern California Regional Office of the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC). In his letter Thiermann refers to Director's report captioned "Communist Target-Youth" with particular reference to the statement on page 7 of the report that the so-called Peace March which took place on Saturday, 5/14/60, in San Francisco was a movement sponsored by the Communist Party (CP). Thiermann disputes the statement, stating that the Peace March was sponsored by his organization in conjunction with a number of other pacifist organizations.

Background of AFSC

Thiermann's letter is typical of the policy long followed by the AFSC through which it has continually made efforts to disassociate itself from communist activities.

The AFSC, organized in 1917, is the subject of a closed [REDACTED] file (Profile [REDACTED]) which indicates that the stated purposes of the organization are to relieve human suffering and ease international tensions. The organization is composed of persons who are members of the religious Society of Friends but is not an official organ of the Society. Informants have characterized it as a sincere pacifist group, and our investigations of it have not disclosed any subversive activity or active communist infiltration of the AFSC.

On the other hand, the activities of the AFSC have often clearly paralleled the CP line and have often been conducted in conjunction with CP front groups.

Parallels With CP Line

The AFSC, for example, has engaged in sending funds for Russian relief (1947); sharply criticized U. S. foreign policy on widespread issues; criticized loyalty oaths; opposed the Smith Act; criticized the capitalistic system; opposed ban on subversives in public office; encouraged conscientious objectors to refuse to defend the country; protested nuclear testing; and engaged in sponsoring private exchange delegations with the Soviet Union.

CP Sponsorship of Peace March

In reference to Thiermann's disputing statement that the CP was not a sponsor for the Peace March, it should be noted that the definition of the word "sponsor" includes: "One who enters into an engagement on behalf of another." This, of course, the CP did in respect to the so-called Peace March on 5/14/60 in San Francisco and we were absolutely correct in so stating. To show the Party's sponsorship, the following evidence is set forth.

In CP's west coast publication, People's World, issue of 5/7/60, the Party called attention to the Peace March with separate articles on pages 3 and 7 as a means of encouraging CP participation in the March.

The CP telephone campaign conducted in the San Francisco area prior to the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HCUA) hearings which was designed to reach 1,000 people was directed at achieving two objectives: (1) solidifying opposition to the hearings, and (2) publicizing the Peace March on 5/14/60.

At a meeting on 5/11/60 in San Francisco a communist front organization formed plans to organize a demonstration in honor of witnesses subpoenaed by the HCUA. The demonstration was planned for 12:00 noon on 5/14/60 specifically so that it could be blended into the proposed Peace March. To build up attendance for this demonstration, [REDACTED], west coast communist who played a national role in the San Francisco riots, distributed leaflets outside city hall on 5/13/60 urging recipients to attend the "demonstration" at noon Saturday, 5/14/60.

Observation:

Dear Sir:

The San Francisco Office of the American Friends Service Committee has recently noted your report entitled "Communist Target - Youth". On page 7 of this report, you state: "Arrangements were made to have the demonstrators join a party-sponsored 'Peace March' on Saturday, May 14, 1960, at the conclusion of the hearings."

The Executive Committee of the American Friends Service Committee in San Francisco has asked me to write to indicate its regret that apparently you have been misinformed about sponsorship of the May 14 Peace Walk. The basic facts are easily ascertainable and a matter of public record. The Peace Walk was sponsored by these San Francisco organizations: The American Friends Service Committee, Fellowship of Reconciliation, Unitarian Fellowship for Social Justice, Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, and World Affairs Committees of the International-Interracial Commission (American Baptist).

The American Friends Service Committee intends to continue to encourage democratic expression of concern for policed disarmament.

Dear Sir:

Please refer to your letter to me dated August 8, 1960.

I believe you will want to know that I was aware of the involvement of the groups mentioned in the second paragraph of your letter, and, of course, my article "Communist Target- Youth" did not exclude the varied backing of the "Peace March."

Additionally, you will want to know that the evidence is conclusive relating to "a party-sponsored" (that is "engagement on behalf of another") campaign. For example, (1) communist leaders issued orders to insure that every available communist in the area would actively participate in the "March"; (2) the communist vehicle "People's World" publicized it favorably in advance; (3) the Communist Party conducted a telephone campaign encouraging participation; (4) communists also organized a demonstration to take place just prior to the "Peace March," and it was designed to merge with it; (5) leaflets were distributed by Communist Party members encouraging attendance at this demonstration; (6) communists arranged for transportation of supporters to the scene of the demonstration and "March"; (7) communists, as you may know, took considerable credit for having made the "Peace March" a success.

The above and other related activities of the Communist Party certainly preclude any logical conclusion being drawn that the party was not so engaged.

NOTE TO SAC, CINCINNATI FROM PAGE ONE

Correspondent enclosed a pamphlet entitled, "Alternatives To The Arms Race - Strategic But Thinkable," by W. H. Perry, which was published by the American Friends Service Committee, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This pamphlet discusses the evils of an arms race and recommends total disarmament even though this might mean the United States would be taken over by Russia. It points out that such domination by Russia is "thinkable" and that a nuclear war is "unthinkable."

The American Friends Service Committee is a pacifist group which has opposed military conflict, imperialism and the drafting of men since it was created in 1917. It was the subject of an investigation in 1942; however, it was found not to be engaged in subversive activities.

Nixon goes to Whittier and will bring forth some sensational-type information which will discredit him to the extent that he will not be elected to the Presidency. [REDACTED] did not identify the two members of his Sunday school class but stated that neither he nor his sources have any further details concerning the nature of the information.

You will be advised of any further pertinent data which is received concerning this matter.

Dear Mr. Hoover,

We read in the San Francisco Chronicle, July 19, 1960, a statement by you in which you referred to the Peace March of May 14th as being "party - sponsored".

We heard about the march from the American Friends Service Committee, and participated in it. Before the march began a spokesman from the A.F.S.C. informed the participants that only posters and placards pertinent to the march (i.e., dealing with the upcoming summit conference) would be permitted. We were also admonished to behave with dignity and decorum, and not to argue with those whose views were different from ours.

Also, the march was rerouted to avoid passing the student demonstration at the City Hall. While some individual persons may have participated in both events, there certainly was no connection between the two.

Lately we have read and heard statements (such as yours) which would tend to make people wonder if groups such as the American Friends Service Committee were being infiltrated by communists. Is there perhaps a communist conspiracy to make the general public think that all such worthwhile organizations are communist front groups, and thereby lessen the effectiveness of these groups. If so, statements such as yours certainly aid the communists in fulfilling this aim.

Dear Sir:

Please refer to the letter to me dated August 19, 1960, from Mrs. [redacted] and you. The statement mentioned in your letter is apparently taken from my report, "Communist Target--Youth." My report did not exclude the varied backing of the "Peace March" on May 14, 1960. However, you will want to know that the evidence is conclusive concerning "a party-sponsored" (that is "engagement on behalf of another") campaign.

For example, the communist newspaper, "People's World," favorably publicized the "March" in advance; communist leaders instructed available communists in the area to participate actively in the "March"; communists carried on a telephone campaign to urge participation; communists organized a demonstration to take place just prior to the "March," which demonstration was to merge with it; communists arranged for transportation of supporters to the demonstration and "March"; and communists took considerable credit for making the "Peace March" a success.

As to whether or not statements of mine on communist theory and practice aid the communists, it appears to me that it is more dangerous to our free society to permit the subverting efforts of communists to go unpublicized than it is to tell the American people the facts about communist efforts to infiltrate and exploit organizations legitimately expressing their opinions. In addition, I can assure you that the communist invectives continuously directed against the FBI and me are not the result of my giving any help to the communist conspiratorial cause.

I would like to make it clear that, in writing "Communist Target--Youth," I wanted to point out how communists can infiltrate and exploit the expressions of genuine democratic thought and practice, turning such actions to the selfish benefit of their cause.

American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) is a pacifist group and Bureau investigation has not disclosed any subversive activities or active communist infiltration of AFSC. However, activities of AFSC have paralleled CP in criticizing loyalty oaths and Smith Act; protesting nuclear weapons testing and condemning U. S. foreign policy. AFSC has worked with several CP fronts in past including American Russian Institute, Labor Youth League, California Labor School, American Committee for Protection of Foreign Born designated under Executive Order 10450 by the Attorney General.

In May of this year we (my husband and I) were contacted by a representative of the American Friends Service Committee ~~_____~~ Peace Caravan in ~~_____~~. A group of local citizens thought it might be an interesting experience and agreed to sponsor the program.

Four college students, one Indian, one German and two American, came the first of August and presented their panel before service organizations, church groups, etc.

We have had several people tell us the American Friends Service Committee is a subversive organization, that the students are being used to spread Communistic propoganda, etc. We do not like this kind of criticism unless there is a basis for it and ofcourse, would regret very much having sponsored such a group.

At 12:25 p.m. 11-13-60, [REDACTED] telephoned to report that the Pentagon was being picketed by a number of persons distributing pacifist literature identified as sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee and other Quaker organizations. [REDACTED] stated that the pickets were peaceful, carried signs urging disarmament such as "Military Power Does Not Bring Security," and were not interfering in any way with persons approaching the Pentagon.

[REDACTED] said he was merely reporting the picketing for our information, noting that there had been radio announcements, warning that picketing would take place, well in advance.

May I recall correspondence with you last August on your booklet, "Communist Target - Youth," and your statement that a May 14 Peace Walk in San Francisco was "a party-sponsored" event.

The San Francisco Regional Office of the American Friends Service Committee continues to feel such use of sponsorship is misleading and is being confused with attendance at public events. Sponsorship implies delegated responsibility, as a senator who sponsors a piece of legislation. Should such legislation be publicized and endorsed by the Communist Party, we believe it would be misleading to claim the senator's bill was "party-sponsored." So long as public events are sponsored in our country, we do not know of any constitutional way of prohibiting announcement or attendance. At events we sponsor, we maintain firm control of funds, topics, literature, and choice of speakers.

Be that as it may, I expect to be in Washington for a week beginning February 22 and would be pleased to discuss with you at your convenience, or a member of your staff, your advice for the conduct of public events of broad general interest in San Francisco.





The "People's World" (PW), a West Coast Communist newspaper, of February 11, 1961, on page 12, contained an announcement that the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) (Quaker) had called for a "NATIONWIDE WITNESS FOR PEACE" and indicated that locally (San Francisco) there would be an "EASTER PEACE WALK" to cover fifty miles, from the Lockheed missile plant in Sunnyvale, California, to Union Square, downtown San Francisco, this walk to start March 28, 1961, and arriving at Union Square on April 1, 1961.

Another source has advised that an "EASTER PEACE WALK" for Saturday, April 1, 1961, sponsored by the AFSC, was announced at a meeting of the San Francisco County Committee of the CP on February 6, 1961. Headquarters for the walk is 2160 Lake Street, San Francisco office of the AFSC. The walk is scheduled for 12:00 noon, starting at Golden Gate Park and going to Union Square in downtown San Francisco.

"EASTER PEACE WALK"

A source which has furnished reliable information in the past reported that at a meeting of the Northern California Communist Party (CP) District Committee on February 18, 1961, [redacted] who is also [redacted] CP, USA, and is [redacted] of the "People's World" (PW) newspaper, a West Coast Communist publication, reported on the decisions of the Northern California CP District Board in regard to the Party's program on peace demonstrations.

[redacted] stated that the District Board singled out the issue of peace as being of first importance for work in the immediate future. He stated that the Party's "declaration" characterized the peace movement as one of the greatest popular mass movements of all time. [redacted] stated that in view of this there ought not be any reservation about "our" participation in it. He stated that it should be considered a major obligation upon the District Committee to engage in the peace movement wherever and whenever possible.

[redacted] specifically cited the coming "EASTER PEACE WALK" scheduled for April 1st. He stated that the District Board had raised this particular peace demonstration to the level where it is a political obligation on the leadership of the County and Club organization and that every individual CP member is held accountable to the Party for participation in this demonstration. [redacted] stated it would be a violation of a profound political obligation to the Party and to the national working class for a comrade to fail to participate in this demonstration and others like it.

[redacted] stated that the Quakers (American Friends Service Committee) who are leading the "EASTER PEACE WALK" want very definitely to maintain their leadership. He stated that he thought those in the Party who wanted to fight them for this leadership are foolish. [redacted] stated that, while "we" want to maintain tight control within the Party, this does not mean that the Party should control the demonstrations, but should

cooperate in staging them and allow the Quakers or other groups to take the normal leadership. [REDACTED] stated that this is a realistic approach, because the Quakers have stated that they do not want to have co-sponsors or any such arrangement, but that they leave the door open to full participation by any group.

The District Committee at this meeting adopted a resolution which read as follows:

"Resolved, that the membership be urged to participate in the peace march in San Francisco on April 1st and those counties too far removed to participate should organize simultaneous demonstrations in their areas."

On March 13, 1961, [REDACTED], Great Lakes Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, Illinois, furnished the Chicago Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation a copy of a letter dated March 1, 1961, which was addressed to the Commandant, Great Lakes Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, Illinois, and was sent by the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC), 300 West Congress Parkway, Chicago 7, Illinois. This letter addressed to the Commandant stated that as had become the custom in the Chicago area during the Easter-Passover Season, there would be a peace walk from the Great Lakes Naval Training Station, Great Lakes, Illinois, held on April 1, 1961, to culminate a "1961 Week for World Peace" which was being co-sponsored by the AFSC and the Chicago Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy (SANE).

The letter went on to state that the purpose of the "1961 Week for World Peace" and similar activities in cities throughout the country and abroad is to provide an

opportunity for large numbers of people to express their will for the peaceful settlement of all international differences and their desire for world conditions which take away the occasion for war.

In connection with the peace walk itself, the letter noted that as last year a group of people would assemble outside the main gate at the Great Lakes Naval Training Center the evening of Thursday, March 30, 1961, to begin a peace walk to the Loop. The letter stated that this original group would be joined by others as the walk progressed southward toward Chicago. This AFSC letter ended by noting that the AFSC was advising the Commandant, Great Lakes Naval Training Center, of this activity so that he would know the purpose and function of the group which will assemble outside the Great Lakes Naval Training Center. The letter concluded by stating that the discipline of the peace walk would include all aspects of the "spirit of non-violence."

On February 9, 1961, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, made available a leaflet published by the AFSC, 300 West Congress Parkway, Chicago 7, Illinois, which stated it, the leaflet, was a call to participate in a week for world peace March 26 through April 1, 1961, as part of a nationwide "witness for peace Easter-1961."

The aforementioned AFSC leaflet further stated that the nation-wide witness for peace Easter-1961 activities would include film and discussion meetings during the two months preceding the week of March 26 through April 1, 1961, leaflet distribution in local communities March 26 through April 1, 1961, and a walk for peace beginning Thursday, March 30, 1961, in the evening, from the Great Lakes Naval Training Center to the Chicago Loop, said walk to culminate Saturday afternoon, April 1, 1961, at which time a peace rally would be held at which prominent speakers to be announced would appear.

This AFSC leaflet also notes that other participating organizations in the peace activities of the week for world peace were the Fellowship of Reconciliation and the Student Peace Union.

A second source, an agency that collects security information in the Chicago area, on March 14, 1961, advised that on February 14, 1961, the AFSC made arrangements with the management of the Morrison Hotel, 79 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois, to hold a rally at this hotel in the hotel's Terrace Casino. The arrangements for this rally called for the attendance of approximately 1,600 persons with the rally to be held between the hours of 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., April 1, 1961.

Please allow me to express my appreciation for your outstanding book, "Masters of Deceit". Indeed it is a book which should be found in every American home.

In the Philadelphia Daily News, three star edition, page eight, under dateline of March 6, 1961, it was announced that Mr. Vladimir Trifonov, a member of the Russian ambassadorial delegation is scheduled to address the student body at Temple University, Philadelphia. This discussion entitled, "International Good-Will" is being sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee. In this article it is stated that these lectures are designed to help improve relations between the Soviet Union and the United States. It is further stated that Mr. Trifonov was previously scheduled to address the students of Quakertown High School, but was denied the privilege because of a school board decision which points out that since Russian delegations are renowned for spy and propaganda activity, it would not be wise to expect a Russian delegate to give fair and impartial observation on the U.S. - Russian situation.

My question is this: Why, at the very moment that the President of the United States is issuing a clarion call to all young men and women willing to devote their efforts in the service of the Peace Corps, are our universities ridiculously allowing our students to be perverted by Russian deceit? It is a fair assumption that Mr. Trifonov is a trained propagandist who will leave the students with the false impression that Russia is the defender of freedom and the United States the suppressor; and that Soviet Fascism is not such a bad proposition after all. To a young man such as myself it is frustrating indeed.

My primary purpose in writing this letter is to give you, through your office, the opportunity to take appropriate action in this matter. I am confident that if Mr. Trifonov is given a welcomed reception at Temple University it will open the door to continued Soviet mass deception in our schools. If we can't stop these particular lectures, perhaps we can at least have a loyal observer analyze any statements made and then repudiate them publicly. Also, I have serious doubts about the American Friends Service Committee. Up to the present

time it has been by all appearances a Quaker Pacifist group.
Has it been corrupted to the point of being a sounding board
for Russian lies?

I have received your letter dated March 12, 1961, and I want you to know that I most certainly share your view concerning Soviet purpose in appearing before American student bodies.

Inasmuch as the motivations of our universities and other groups in affording the Soviets opportunities to propagandize their point of view are many and varied, I am unable to specifically reply to your inquiries. Moreover, the formation and promulgation of the regulations defining the proper norm of diplomatic activity in this country lie properly within the province of the Department of State. It may interest you to know, however, that through the years I have held the position that the formation of such regulations pertaining to travel and public appearances of the Soviet diplomatic corps should be on a strict reciprocal basis, fully consistent with the privileges enjoyed by our representatives in the Soviet Union.

In view of the responsibilities of the Department of State in the area about which you wrote, I am taking the liberty of forwarding a copy of your letter to that Department.

This story states that about 15 persons from Greater Lafayette are expected to participate in a week-long peaceful demonstration protesting manufacture of chemical warfare agents at an Army Chemical Corps facility near Newport, about 60 miles southwest of Lafayette, Indiana.

Professor IRVING A. MORRISSETT, Purdue University, West Lafayette, Indiana, and one of the individual sponsors for the "Witness for Peace" demonstration at the plant gates, Sunday through Easter, said most of the adult members of the West Lafayette Friends meeting and several non-members have expressed interest in participating in the vigil.

Professor MORRISSETT, a member of the executive committee of the Dayton, Ohio regional office of the American Friends Service Committee, said he planned to participate this coming weekend, on Easter, and possibly one day during the week. The names of other demonstrators were not listed.

The demonstration, under the auspices of the Dayton office of the Friends committee and other organizations, will be aimed at encouraging the government to seek an end to the arms race and achieve disarmament; give participants an opportunity to show their concern over dangers of the arms race and the growing acceptance of chemical and biological/and other weapons of mass destruction, and to give witness to their conviction that it is wrong and impractical to seek safety by preparing to destroy millions of fellow human beings. MORRISSETT ruled out the possibility of violence. Participants must agree to refrain from illegal actions such as civil disobedience, and not to retaliate when violence is committed against them.

In connection with a planned "silent vigil" in protest of the U. S. Army Chemical Corps Installation at Newport, Indiana, from 3/25/61 to 4/2/61, St. [REDACTED] contacted [REDACTED] at Newport, Indiana, on 3/16/61. [REDACTED] who is very active in Boy Scouts and in civic matters within the area of Newport, Indiana, stated that he contacted the leaders of the Quaker Church in Newport, Indiana, and they advised that a delegation of the American Friends Service Committee had contacted that church and requested their support at the site of the Newport plant during 3/25 through 4/2/61. [REDACTED] said that the members of this church refused to have anything to do with this movement at Newport, Indiana. They refused to allow their use of the church for a service as they had planned on the morning of the so-called "vigil." He said that the leaders of this

church also advised them that members of their church would not take part in their plan.

[REDACTED] said that he learned that the delegation then contacted the Vermillion County, Indiana Ministerial Association. He said that he then contacted this association and they advised him that they told the delegation that they wanted no part of their movement and that none of the members of this association planned to take part in this vigil.

[REDACTED] said that he does not expect any of the local people to join the American Friends Committee in their protest at the Newport, Indiana Army Chemical Corps plant. He said that if anything, some of the local people may actively protest the presence of this group.

[REDACTED] stated that he would be on hand daily if the "protest" developed and he would advise this Office of pertinent developments.

Seattle will join New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Dayton, Chicago, Los Angeles, and San Francisco in simultaneous peace walks, rallies, vigils, and public meetings. Each will proclaim a common message, goal, and symbol. Initial sponsorship and direction is being given by regional officers of the American Friends Service Committee."

This leaflet sets forth the plans for the Seattle April 1, 1961 Easter Peace Witness Project, and the plans are as follows:

8:00 a.m. Silent Vigil outside the 36th and Government Way entrance to Fort Lawton. This Vigil will offer the opportunity for meditation and for quiet witness to the religious or moral basis of our disagreement with the military policy of our government.

(Fort Lawton is the site of the "Missile-Master," the electronic brain in charge of setting off all the Nike missiles in the Seattle-Tacoma area.)

10:00 a.m. A short address by Rev. Daniel Taylor, minister at the Rose City Park Methodist Church in Portland, and previously chairman of the Board of World Peace of the Methodist Church.

Final instructions for Peace Walkers: It is imperative that all participants be on hand at this time. Please come early for registration, etc., so that we will be able to follow our time schedule.)

10:30 a.m. Peace Walk begins.

3:30 p.m. PUBLIC MEETING at CITY HALL PARK, 3rd Avenue and Yesler Way.

Speakers will be: Norman Thomas, past Presidential candidate, and

Robert Picrus, dynamic figure in the U. S. peace movement."

This leaflet points out that all walkers should attend the organizational meeting at 10 AM on April 1, 1961 preceding the Walk, and that walkers would be mostly in double file carrying posters at regular intervals. Some will distribute flyers as the walk proceeds, and some will be asked to distribute leaflets at strategic corners at crowded areas. This leaflet also asks that non-walkers can make an important contribution through evaluation and interpretation to bystanders.

This source also made available a copy of a leaflet which accompanied the above-described leaflet, and this second leaflet is entitled "Witness For Peace Easter 1961." The second leaflet identifies itself as being sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee and among other things, this document states that "we urge these steps:

"An immediate break with the policy of military deterrence, including:

1. An unequivocal ban on nuclear weapons testing, and the establishment of an international test ban commission.
2. An immediate end to missile weapons development, and the internationalization of space research.
3. An end to preparations for biological and chemical warfare, and the transformation of germ warfare centers into world health centers.

A step by step conversion of our military budget to constructive peaceful activities including:

1. A maximum support of world economic and social development.
2. Greatly increased support for the United Nations.
3. Development of state and national plans to aid conversion of our economy to a peaceful basis."

On 3/30/61, [redacted] furnished a pamphlet captioned "Act for Peace," which indicated that it was sponsored by the above captioned organization, and other pacifist type organizations: The Greater Boston Committee For a Sane Nuclear Policy, The Fellowship of Reconciliation, The Women's International League for Peace and Freedom.

This pamphlet advertised a vigil at the State House in Boston, Mass. on 3/31/61, and a "Walk For Peace" on Saturday, April 1, 1961, from Lexington, Mass. to Faneuil Hall, Boston, Mass.

The pamphlet stated that this "Walk for Peace" was being made to:

1. Urge our government to end the nuclear arms race and begin the process of disarmament.

2. Confront public apathy and make visible our concern by this literal act.
3. Demonstrate solidarity with the Aldermaston marchers in England and with fellow citizens who are planning similar activities in New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Seattle, Philadelphia and other cities across the U.S.

On 3/30/61, [REDACTED] advised that the members of the North Shore Section, CP, USA, New England District, were planning, on an individual basis, to participate in part of this "Walk for Peace" on 4/1/61.

Friends Committee Spends \$4.8 Million For Welfare, Peace

The American Friends Service Committee spent \$4,832,490 in the fiscal year that ended Oct. 1, 1961, to relieve human suffering and to seek non-violent solutions to conflicts throughout the world.

Algerian refugees, displaced persons in Hong Kong and Europe, Negro school children in Prince Edward county, Virginia, American Indians, and farm laborers in California were among the beneficiaries of the Committee's work.

ISSUES ACCOUNTING

Based in Philadelphia and related by conviction to the religious beliefs of the Society of Friends, the Committee issued an accounting Saturday of its income and disbursements for the year.

It received more than \$3,407,000 in cash contributions from individuals, foundations and \$243,357 in surplus foods and material aids, the Committee said.

Most of its expenditures, or more than \$2,023,947, went for aid to 250,000 Algerian refugees and other displaced persons in Hong Kong and Europe and for social and technical programs in Africa and other areas of the world.

The balance financed school programs, international affairs conferences and seminars, peace education work and the Committee's community relations program in the United States.

The community relations pro-

gram included the relocation of 47 Negro high school students from Prince Edward county, Virginia, to integrated schools elsewhere in the Nation after the county's schools were closed to avoid desegregation.

SUMMARIZE GOALS

Harold Evans, chairman of the Committee, summarized the organization's goals for 1962 in these words:

"A crying need of the world is for better communications and greater mutual understanding among all men. We share that need.

"To build on the foundations that have been laid for us, to see more clearly the needs of a distraught and fearful world and to meet such of them as lie within our scope and abilities, to be more sensitive and courageous, to work more effectively with all men of good will to establish peace and justice in the world—these are our goals."

On 3/23/61, [redacted], who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised SA [redacted] that at a meeting of the NYD, CP, INDUSTRIAL DIVISION COUNCIL, held 3/22/61, in NYC, announcements were handed out concerning a conference on labor and peace to be held in Chicago, Ill., on 4/14 and 15/61, under the auspices of the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC). This announcement listed participation by a number of prominent labor leaders. The informant advised that the NYD CP is interested in this conference to the point that they want 50 CP members from NYC to attend for the purpose of proposing that the conference be given permanent status by the AFSC and further that authorization be obtained for the establishment of a New York Chapter. Instructions were also given to those attending the Industrial Council meeting for the members to return to their unions and talk up this affair with the idea of inducing the unions to send delegations to the conference. The purpose of this is

to get as large a delegation as possible from New York to attend, thus increasing the chances for establishing a permanent organization.

On 4/9/61, ██████████ advised that following a meeting of the New York Chapter, Negro American Labor Council, (NALC) on 4/8/61, it was ascertained that the unions contacted by some of the CP members who attended above meeting were unresponsive to sending delegations to Chicago. The NYD CP was, therefore, increasing its efforts to get as many of its members as possible to go.

[REDACTED] stated that the objective of the vigil was to witness their concern over the dangers of the arms race and the growing acceptance of chemical and biological and other weapons of mass destruction; to witness to their conviction it is wrong and impractical to seek our safety by preparing to destroy millions of our fellow human beings, and to encourage the government to seek an end to the arms race and achieve disarmament. [REDACTED] stated that this group sent out letters to persons in Newport, Indiana inviting them to join in this vigil. These letters included a letter entitled, "Vigil at Newport, March 26, 1961 to April 2, 1961," setting forth the objectives of the "Witness for Peace," and it was signed by Robert M. Eddy, Co-ordinator, American Friends Service Committee, Incorporated, Dayton Regional Office, 915 Salem Avenue, Dayton 6, Ohio. Also included in these letters were two pamphlets entitled, "A Call to Witness for Peace," and "Walk for Disarmament." The letters reflected that the following persons were sponsors of the vigil:

I described to them how as late as April 17 of 1959, by which time Castro had violently attacked and insulted the United States, the American people nevertheless gave him a friendly welcome and the United States Government made a sincere effort to find some basis of understanding with him. I also described at length the character of the man Castro and how, as with Hitler, Mussolini, and Stalin, this must be considered in the policies which he follows. I described to them his early days as a student gangster, his participation in the Bogota riots, his general irresponsibility and amorality, etc.

In all of this I felt that I made some impression on all those present with the exception of Robert Lyon and Frances Neely. Lyon had returned from Cuba only recently, and while he admitted that there is some opposition to Castro within the country, he is quite clearly completely sold on the Castro-Communist line. At one point he did seem to admit that the recent Theodore Draper article in the March issue of Encounter magazine had given him some pause. I suggested to the group that they tended to accept the claim that the end justifies the means and that it should look more closely at the means which Castro has followed in the past two years, and then consider whether he will ever reach the goals which were an original part of the 26th of July program.

Pages 13 - 23 contain an article entitled, "My Trip to Moscow" by RICHARD H. MC FEELY, Principal, George School.

MC FEELY and JOEL B. HAYDEN, JR., a teacher of Russian and music at a Friends Meeting School in New Hampshire, visited schools in Moscow during the summer of 1961.

MC FEELY and HAYDEN were asked to visit schools in Moscow by the School Affiliation Service of the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC).

In March 1961, the Ministry of Education of the Soviet Union sent an invitation for two teachers to spend two weeks in Moscow visiting schools there. The U. S. State Department encouraged the AFSC to accept the invitation as it was the first time that such a visit had been possible under conditions offered.

D HAYDEN and MC FEELY were guests of the Ministry of Education while in Moscow and all expenses were paid by the Ministry.

Two Soviet teachers will visit schools in the United States on a reciprocal basis in the fall of 1961.

MC FEELY's impressions of education in the Soviet Union are set forth in the article.

The "George School Bulletin," mentioned above, was furnished by [redacted] who has furnished reliable information in the past, on 10/9/61 to SA [redacted]

An information copy is being sent to the Boston Office since that office covers New Hampshire where HAYDEN is a teacher.

One of its current activities is fostering good will between young people of various nations and for this reason, it is recently subject of citizen's inquiries.

After our last Monthly Meeting of Friends (Quakers) here, the treasurer of our church told me the American Friends Service Committee was infiltrated with "Reds", and he did not want reported through him the money we had collected \$8.55 - for blankets for Algerian refugees.

He questioned the honesty of the organization, and that has disturbed me greatly. Of course

Quakers are human beings and subject to temptations, but I have known so many of them personally, that I just didn't believe his inference. He did not want to tell me the source of his information.

He was a soldier in the Second World War and works now at the chemical warfare plant here. He was very much opposed to the Peace Vigils last Easter week.

As a matter of fact none of our church participated in it. Most of us felt it was the wrong method to work for peace. This young man stated then that he believed it was Communist-inspired. I did not

argue with them, you & I did not
believe it was - I knew too
many of the leaders. This time
he said ^{he knew} it possible for you
to tell me whether or not the
American Friends Service

Committee is Red-infiltrated?
I have been helping with
the relief program since its
beginning during World War One.
But I want to know the
Truth, please, even tho it may hurt.

On January 16, 1962, information was received from a source to the effect that the American Friends Service Committee, 3959 - 15th Avenue N.E., Seattle, Washington, has announced that a public demonstration against civil defense, sponsored by an independent group "Peace is the Shelter" will be held in Seattle, Washington on January 20, 1962 at 10 a.m. The American Friends Service Committee has also announced that this public demonstration will gather at Fifth and Madison Streets, Seattle, Washington, and then proceed to the downtown area of Seattle ending near the Civil Defense office located at 1721 - 7th Avenue, Seattle, Washington, for a twenty minute vigil. Posters to be carried by individuals participating in this demonstration will feature the theme that "Peace is the only Shelter" and that civil defense itself endangers peace.

Authorities at the Seattle, Washington Police Department have been advised concerning the above-described public demonstration.
