After the meeting at the Hotel Stevens on Dec 14, it was decided to have the members of the various bureaus meet at the Hotel Stevens on Dec 16 to discuss the problem of getting the old men to leave their homes and go to the new one. This was done at the insistence of the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Bureau of Reclamation. The men from the BIA were to take care of the Indians while the old men were to be left alone. The Bureau of Reclamation, however, insisted that the old men be moved to the new home. The old man who had been instrumental in getting the Indians to move to the new home, was given responsibility for the old men. He was to go out in the morning and see that the old men were up and to make sure they were dressed and ready to go to the new home. This man, however, did not do this. Reference is made to my letter dated July 17, 1935, which was addressed to the U. S. Attorney, Southern District of New York, transmitting a copy of an undated anonymous letter received by this office, stating that [REDACTED] on numerous occasions, during the time that SCOTT was a fugitive, contacted him and rendered medical assistance. A copy of the anonymous letter, together with a copy of my letter of transmittal addressed to the U. S. Attorney, were forwarded to the Bureau.

Reference is also made to my telephone conversation of July 19th, with Mr. Tamm, advising that Assistant U. S. Attorney Klein, Southern District of New York, had informed me that former U. S. Attorney Martin Conboy, who is acting as Special Prosecutor in the DUTCH SCHWARTZ case, had requested that this office conduct the investigation relative to the alleged activities [REDACTED] b7c

In compliance with Mr. Tamm's telephonic instructions, I personally contacted Mr. Conboy and Mr. Klein and informed them that this Bureau would conduct the requested investigation.

This matter is being assigned and will receive prompt and thorough investigative attention.

I fully expected that incidental to the trial of Arthur ( Dutch Schultz ) Flegenheimer, now being held at Malone, N.Y., there would be a need for my services in your department, at least for the purpose of passing on the qualifications and selection of the jurors for the case.

I fear that the prosecution has made a poor selection in accepting the present jury, and in my humble opinion, the best it can hope for will be another disagreement. This opinion is based on the fact that I know nearly every one who was drawn for the purpose of selecting the jury for this case. I personally know most of the jury. Then too, I have done much investigative work for the local attorneys who are assisting in the defense. Am familiar with their methods and know the type of men they would select for jury service. Neither of them know that I have been examined for appointment in your department.

In the event of a re-trial of this case, in this county, I am ready to assist your department and render any service which I may be called upon to give.


