Subject : Application of Resolution n°3 relative to the illegal and inhuman treatment of accused persons, adopted at the BERNE General Assembly.

When the 18th General Assembly was held in BERNE, the I.C.P.C. protested against the illegal and inhuman treatment of accused persons and recommended that, in all Police training Schools, special importance should be attached to the complete recognition of the rights which all persons suspected of an infringement of the penal law or other persons have to receive loyal and human treatment.

Therefore, I should appreciate if you would let me know the arrangements you have made in your country in order to give this paragraph of resolution n°3 practical application.

Dear Mr. Ducloux:

Reference is made to your letter of January 16, 1950, in which you requested information concerning the arrangements made in connection with Police Training Schools to discuss the rights of persons accused of violations of the laws to receive fair and humane treatment by the police.

The FBI National Academy, which was established in 1935, has as its purpose the training of representatives from the various police agencies in the United States as police instructors and police executives. To date a total of 2,077 law enforcement officers have completed this course of training. Most of these officers are presently engaged in police training activities within their respective departments.


Throughout the entire course of training in the FBI National Academy emphasis is placed on the humane treatment of law violators as required by various statutes based on the constitutions of the individual states. The police officers trained in the National Academy, when conducting schools in their own departments also place great emphasis on this matter.

During the calendar year of 1949, the FBI participated in over twenty-five hundred Police Training Schools throughout the United States. FBI representatives discussed such subjects as interviews, techniques and mechanics of arrest, searches and seizures and numerous other topics at these schools. In the conduct of these schools the fair and humane treatment of all persons involved in criminal activities is stressed by the instructors and the attending officers were informed as

to the proper procedure to be followed in this respect as provided by law.

In connection with the training of the Agent personnel of the FBI, the importance of the proper treatment of individuals violating laws under the jurisdiction of this Bureau is stressed at all times, and the Agents are instructed to afford such persons every consideration to which they are entitled under the laws of the United States.

With reference to the circular of the Secretary General of the I.C.P.C. of the early part of February 1950 regarding the Conference on the Repression of Counterfeiting Currency which will be held from 15th to 17th June inclusive, 1950, and the annual Conference of the International Criminal Police Commission from 19th to 22nd June next, I have the honour to inform you that the Minister of Foreign Affairs in The Hague, on behalf of the Netherlands Government, has instructed its Representative in your country by letter of 31st January last to request the competent authorities to send representatives of the Police and of the Institutes of Issue to both of these conferences.

 AND THE ANNUAL ICPC CONFERENCE

PACIFICATIONS:

As you are aware, the Bureau is a member of the International Criminal Police Commission for the United States and as such acts as liaison between the ICPC and other law enforcement agencies in this country.

FACTS:

An announcement has been received from the ICPC Office at The Hague, Holland, relative to the conference to be held in that city June 15 to 17, inclusive, 1950, regarding the repression of counterfeit currency, and the annual conference of the ICPC from June 19 to 22. This agency advised that the Minister of Foreign Affairs in The Hague, on behalf of the Netherlands Government, under date of January 31, 1950, instructed its representative in the United States to request the competent authorities to send representatives of the police and of the currency issuing agency to both of these conferences.

The Bureau has not as yet received an official invitation to attend the conferences.

In view of the short time before the conferences are to be held and since the date of these conferences will coincide with the opening of the summer season at Scheveningen, Mr. Goossen, of the Dutch Police, forwarded a booklet with general information regarding the Netherlands and a list of hotel prices together with a form request for reservations.

Mr. Goossen has further advised that upon receipt of a reply to the invitation of the Netherlands Government, a sufficient number of hotel list prices and reservation forms will be forwarded.

RECOMMENDATION:

In the past when the Bureau has sent a representative to the annual ICPC Assembly, the Legal Attaché in Paris has been designated as the Bureau's delegate. It is recommended that the same procedure be followed again when the official invitation is received.

The first conference concerning the repression of counterfeit currency, however, is of no interest to the Bureau, but it might be of interest to the Secret Service. When the official invitations are received, it is recommended that no objection be raised in the event Secret Service desires to send a representative to that conference.

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

In the event other application forms are received, however, it is believed that one copy should be furnished to the Secret Service in the event that organization desires to have a representative attend the first conference which will be limited to counterfeiting matters.


Subject: INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL POLICE COMMISSION

Dear Monsieur Pucleux:

Enclosed herewith is a copy of the pamphlet issued by the United Nations Economic and Social Council under date of April 3, 1950, captioned "Non-Governmental Organizations: Policy of Consultation, Arrangements, Resolutions of February 1950." This pamphlet was furnished to Mr. William G. Galvin of the United Nations Secretariat, who is the chief liaison officer between the United Nations and non-governmental organizations, and under the new rules the International Criminal Police Commission will continue to enjoy consultative status.

The enclosed document contains the controlling rules and regulations recently adopted pertaining to the definition of non-governmental organizations and their relationship to the United Nations Economic and Social Council and related bodies. It also was revised by Mr. James G. Galvin of the United Nations Secretariat, who is the chief liaison officer between the United Nations and non-governmental organizations, that under the new rules the International Criminal Police Commission will continue to enjoy consultative status.

Mr. Galvin of the United Nations Secretariat of the United Nations Economic and Social Council advised Mr. Galvin that one of the projects presently being undertaken by the Economic and Social Council is a resolution relating to the regulation of primitive methods of justice prior to conviction. Mr. Galvin did not furnish any copy of the proposed International Criminal Police Commission and the information contained in the pamphlet, but I am enclosing it for your information and your attention. It is my desire to keep you fully informed on any legal subject of interest to the Commission.

The Bureau recently received a formal letter communication from Mr. L. Ducloux, General Secretary, International Criminal Police Commission, along with the draft of a proposed article pertaining to the crime problem in Los Angeles for publication in the International Criminal Police Review, in which Ducloux requested advice as to the accuracy of the alleged facts and the advisability of publishing it.

The Bureau by letter dated April 3, 1950, instructed the Legal Attaché, Paris, to contact Mr. Ducloux, and tactfully explain to him that the FBI could not, on account of the nature of the material, either vouch for the accuracy of the facts or make recommendations as to publication. The Legal Attaché was told to advise Ducloux of the jurisdiction of the FBI and our inability to be of assistance in matters of this nature.

By cablegram dated April 14, 1950, the Legal Attache, Paris, stated that the Bureau's position was tactfully explained to Ducloux but that the latter still desired to publish the Los Angeles crime story. Ducloux requested that the FBI authorize him to communicate directly with the Chief of Police, Los Angeles, in order to check facts in the story. The Legal Attache requested a reply by cable.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Legal Attaché, Paris, tell Mr. Ducloux that the Bureau has no objection if he desires to contact the Chief of Police, Los Angeles, directly. The Legal Attaché, however, should tactfully explain that this incident was merely a single exception to the accepted relationship whereby the FBI handles his contacts in the United States. A draft cablegram is being attached.

UNITED STATES:

Does Los Angeles bid fair to become a second Chicago as a consequence of gangster activities? The authorities in California, from Governor EARL WARREN to the Mayor of this active city, L.A. FLETCHER BOWFON to the sheriff, EUGENE BISCAILLUZ, challenge the actual existence of this threat and announce that they have resolved, at all events, to ward it off by every means in their power.

Statistics, as a whole, justify their optimism. Crimes and serious offenses, for the entire area of Greater Los Angeles, decreased in 1948/49 by 20%. The number of murders have dropped from 30 to 24, fatal wounds from 6 to 1 case.

Figures, on the other hand, stress a renewed and extremely alarming outbreak in juvenile delinquency, which has increased by 96.5%. It is fair to assume that it is a question of minor offenses.

However, young people appear to be directly menaced by gangsterism. Gang leaders are manifesting a very intense zeal in the enlistment of young recruits, and it has been confirmed that too many new arrivals have come to the Pacific Coast in order to devote themselves, on behalf of groups of malefactors, to the recruitment of unreliable young people or those already seduced by the "glory" of Rowdy Life.

Police Headquarters in Los Angeles possess an extensive collection of synoptic files, electrically classified. The same supervisor, assisted by thirty-two women clerks, has had charge of these files for 26 years.

If there should be any need to stress the usefulness of such a system of classification, it would suffice to cite the following example:

During the space of three months, 28 cases of housebreaking occurred in Los Angeles, all of which, presented the same characteristic clues:- the perpetrator had made use of lighted matches rather than a flashlight, and in each case, articles of food had been stolen.

Searches made by means of sorting machines based on the mentioned modus operandi, permitted suspicion to be concentrated on three individuals. Since two of them happened to be in jail at the time, police officers called at the home of the third, a certain JOSEPH C.... who finally confessed that he was indeed guilty of these cases of house-breaking.

Dans un espace de 3 mois, 28 cambriolages eurent lieu à LOS ANGELES qui, tous, présentaient les mêmes caractères : l'auteur avait employé des allumettes et non pas une lampe de poche, et,

dans chaque cas, des denrées alimentaires avaient été dérobées.



BACKGROUND:

Reference is made to my memorandum dated March 29, 1950, advising that a conference is scheduled by the ICPC to be held at The Hague, Holland, from June 15 to 17 inclusive, 1950, relative to the suppression of counterfeit currency and that the Annual Conference of the ICPC will be held in the same city from June 19 to 22, 1950. At that time it was recommended that since the conference on counterfeit currency would be of no interest to the Bureau but might be of interest to the Secret Service, when the official invitations were received, no objection be raised in the event the Secret Service should desire to send a representative to that conference.

The Bureau has now received an invitation from Monsieur L. Ducloux, the Secretary General of the ICPC, advising that the third conference for the suppression of counterfeit currency will be held from June 15 to 17 and that the 19th Annual General Assembly of the ICPC will be held on June 19, 20, and 21. Monsieur Ducloux invited the Director to attend these conferences or, in the event it was impossible for him to attend, to send a representative.

Monsieur Ducloux suggests that, in as far as the conference on counterfeit currency especially is concerned, he believes that Mr. U. E. Baughman, the head of the Secret Service, might be able to participate in the work of that conference.

Monsieur Ducloux added that an invitation from The Netherlands Government will be sent to the United States through diplomatic channels.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that:

- As suggested in my memorandum of reference, the Bureau's Legal Attaché in Paris, France, be designated as the Bureau's delegate to attend the 19th Annual General Assembly of the ICPC to be held June 19, 20, and 21, 1950. If that recommendation is approved, it is suggested that Mr. Ducloux's letter be referred to the Training and Inspection Division for acknowledgment and the issuance of appropriate instructions to legal Attaché West.
- That the Secret Service be advised of the pending conference on counterfeit currency inasmuch as that conference would probably be of interest to that agency and the Bureau would have no interest in the subject matter of the conference. There is attached a proposed letter to the Secret Service in accordance with this recommendation.

Mr. L. Dacloux, Secretary General of the International Criminal Police Commission in Paris, has advised that the 19th Annual General Assembly of this organization will be held at The Hague on June 19, 20 and 21, 1950. You should arrange to attend as the Bureau's representative.

The Chief of the U. S. Secret Service has been notified of a meeting of the ICPC to be held at The Hague from June 15 to 17, inclusive, relative to the suppression of counterfeit currency. It is not necessary that you attend this meeting dealing with counterfeit currency. The meeting which you are attending is the Annual Conference of the ICPC. In your attendance at this conference and at any other meeting of this organization, it is desired that your attendance be in the nature of an observer. You should not in any way commit the Bureau to any program or to participate in any program of activities unless the full information concerning such program and activities has been previously furnished to the Bureau and the Bureau has specifically approved.

In the event there should arise any emergency matter during the course of the conference concerning which you desire the Bureau's views promptly, you should communicate in the most expeditious manner with the Bureau for the purpose of obtaining these views allowing ample time for the consideration of the matter at the Bureau.

You should submit a detailed report concerning the program which you attend and any information or literature which you believe would be helpful to the Bureau in the performance of its duties, not only of an investigative type but also in the way of cooperation with local law enforcement officers, etc., to be transmitted to the Bureau for this purpose. You are acquainted, of course, with the many cooperative services of the Bureau and will be able to give the value of material, pamphlets and data which might be available for transmission for the purposes of information, study and analysis.

You will, of course, also please review the files of your office with reference to the attendance of your predecessor at similar conferences so that you can identify the problems which might arise.

For your further information, the Bureau's membership and participation in the ICPG is predicated upon the assumption that the FBI is the sole member of the organization from the United States and serves as liaison with other Federal, state, county and local officials. In view of the requests made in recent months by Dr. Harry Goldmann of Stockholm, you are advised that the Bureau has no intention at this time of establishing a radio network for the purposes of communicating with Sweden and does not have under consideration at this time any plans for an extension of its present radio communications facilities. You realize, of course, that the jurisdiction of the FBI does not now extend beyond the jurisdiction of the United States and its territorial possessions and there does not appear to be a necessity for the FBI to establish an international radio network.



Mr. LOUIS DUCLOUX, Secretary General of the I. C. P. C., has forwarded to this office a copy of his letter to the Director, dated March 21, 1950, in which he advised of two Conferences scheduled by the I. C. P. C. from June 15 to 21, 1950, at the Hague. The first Conference will consider the subject of counterfeiting under the April 20, 1929 Geneva Convention and will be held from June 15 to 17, 1950. The second Conference will be the 19th General Assembly of the I. C. P. C. which will take place on June 19 to 21, 1950.

It is noted that Mr. DUCLOUX expressed the opinion in his letter that Mr. J. E. BAUGHMAN, Chief of the Secret Service might participate in the meeting on counterfeiting.

This was the first information this office had received concerning the possibility that BAUGHMAN will attend the coming convention of the I.C.P.C. Inquiry of Mr. GUY SPANGLER, Secret Service Representative in Paris, on March 29 revealed that three or four months ago Mr. DUCLOUX wrote Mr. BAUGHMAN advising him of the I.C.P.C.'s intention to schedule a special meeting on counterfeiting to be held prior to the regular assembly of the I.C.P.C., and inquiring as to whether BAUGHMAN would be able to accept an invitation to attend such a meeting. According to SPANGLER, BAUGHMAN replied that he could not definitely state at that time whether he would be able to attend, but that he would do so if at all possible. BAUGHMAN then wrote SPANGLER to the effect that he would like to attend the meeting, but that he might be engaged on appropriations hearings at that time.

Upon the return to Paris of the Executive Officers of the I.C.P.C., who are now attending the meeting in Monaco, further details concerning this matter will be obtained and the Bureau advised.

It is anticipated that the ~~Director~~ will be requested to extend invitations to the Chief of the Technical Department of the International Criminal Police Commission, the General Secretary of the General Assembly of the I.C.P.C.

There is attached a document of the United Nations Economic and Social Council, issued 3/2/50, entitled, Non-Governmental Organizations Review of Consultative Arrangements -- Resolutions of 2/27/50.

It is suggested that the Bureau may wish to forward this document to the ICPC Headquarters in Paris and to keep the photostatic copy. This document contains the controlling rules and regulations just adopted pertaining to the definition of and relationship of Non-Governmental Organizations to the United Nations Economic and Social Council and related bodies. ASAC William M. Whelan was advised by Mr. Lyman C. White of the Secretariat of the United Nations, who is the chief liaison officer between the United Nations and Non-Governmental Organizations, that the ICPC, under these new rules, will continue to enjoy Consultative Status B.

ASAC Whelan has contacted Mr. White and made himself known as the liaison representative of the ICPC. For the Bureau's information, it did not appear when Mr. Whelan called Mr. White's office that the Headquarters of ICPC have as yet notified the United Nations of his designation as the liaison representative of ICPC in the United States.

For the Bureau's information, Mr. Galway of the Social Defense Section advised ASAC Whelan that one of the projects the Secretariat is studying at the present time concerns the rules and regulations pertaining to the detention of prisoners after arrest and prior to conviction. No comments were requested of Mr. Whelan by Mr. Galway in reference to this matter nor was any suggestion made that the ICPC submit any information on this project. This matter is called to the Bureau's attention because ICPC ~~may~~ want to begin gathering information on this problem if it is of any interest to ICPC.

There is also enclosed an English translation of a letter received directly by ASAC Whelan from Mr. PAUL MARABUTO, Divisional Commissioner to the National Security Reporter of the ICPC, 60 Bd. Gouvion St. Cyr--Paris 17.

ASAC Whelan has determined that the Hotel Lafayette is no longer in existence. Persons familiar with New York hotels have recommended the Hotel Bristol at 129 West 48th Street, as being a most convenient hotel for persons who are only fluent in the French language. It is understood, for instance,



As you are aware, the Legal Attaché, Paris, France, maintains liaison with the International Criminal Police Commission in that city and has been instructed to keep abreast of all developments in the Commission which may be of interest to the Bureau.

In order that the Legal Attaché can be fully informed of the Bureau's relations with the ICPC, it is believed that he should be furnished copies of all correspondence directed to the headquarters of the ICPC. It is not believed that any purpose would be served by furnishing him copies of Bureau correspondence with branch offices of the ICPC, such as those in Rome, Italy and Brussels, Belgium, but it is felt that if he receives copies of the communications addressed to the ICPC Headquarters, he will be adequately informed of the Bureau's relations with the ICPC. This system will, in effect, keep the Legal Attaché advised of the matters which the Bureau has pending with the ICPC much in the same way that Petrel in Canada is advised of all communications directed by the Bureau to the RCMP.

RECOMMENDATION:

If the above recommendation is approved, it is suggested that the attached letter be forwarded to the Legal Attaché in Paris and that the attached memorandum to all officials and supervisors be issued in order that any supervisor who handles ICPC material, either investigative or administrative, will be cognizant of these instructions.

Reference is made to my letter of April 6, 1950, advising that the third conference for the suppression of Counterfeit Currency will be held at The Hague, The Netherlands from June 15 to June 17, 1950.

The Department of State has advised the Attorney General that an official invitation has been extended by The Netherlands Government for representatives of the United States to attend this conference.

Information has also been received concerning the provisional agenda for this conference. It has been indicated that representatives of police services charged with combating counterfeiters and representatives of institutions which issue paper or metal currency will be in attendance at this meeting. The provisional agenda indicates that the following matters will be considered:

1. The legislative text for the protection of currency on a national level and conventions and agreements on an international level.
2. Counterfeitors' tactics in the printing and passing of counterfeit currency - the arrest of counterfeit gangs.
3. Printing procedures used by counterfeiters and the technical protection of genuine currency.
4. Coordination of preventive and suppressive action on national and international levels among authorities interested in the suppression of counterfeiting.

The Bureau will recall that correspondence has previously been received from ICPC indicating that Mr. MARABUTO was coming to New York to attend a conference on Narcotics to be held at United Nations. I am in receipt of a letter, a translation of which is attached, from Mr. Marabuto, advising that meeting of the Narcotics Commission has been postponed from April to August and his trip, therefore, to the United States has been put off.

ASAC W. M. Whelan advised Mr. Victor Keay at the Bureau on March 31, 1950 that a member of the secretariat of U. N. had indicated that the Social Commission of U. N. would like to receive a formal request from ICPC for the draft treaty on Extradition to be placed before it for consideration. Upon receipt of the cable from ICPC which was conveyed to New York by telephone authorizing that such a request be made by Representative Whelan, Mr. Whelan, in consultation with Mr. Edward Galway, a member of the secretariat of the United Nations, prepared a letter, a copy of which is attached, which was deemed appropriate. This letter was signed by Mr. Whelan and delivered to the U. N., 4/6/50.

DISPATCHED

It is suggested that the Bureau and the Department of Justice may be interested in this proposed treaty on extradition. It is entirely possible that ICPC may call upon the Bureau to appear before the Social Commission in reference to this treaty or the Social Commission may call upon Mr. Whelan as the liaison representative of ICPC in reference to some suggestion with regard to this treaty. It is recommended, therefore, that a letter be sent to ICPC, not only advising them of the action that has been taken, but suggesting that several copies of the draft treaty on extradition adopted at the 17th General Assembly of the ICPC, September 1948, at Prague, be forwarded to the Bureau. If ICPC honors this request, it would be appreciated if one copy would be made available to this office.

I have the honour to request that the Social Commission should give consideration to the draft treaty on extradition which was prepared at the 17th session of the International Criminal Police Commission held at Prague, in September 1949.

The attention of the Social Commission is also called to the resolution concerning this draft treaty adopted at the 16th session of the International Criminal Police Commission at Prague, in August 1949, when the President and the Secretary-General were instructed to communicate with the Secretary-General of the United Nations requesting him "to study this question with a view to examining the possibility of putting on the agenda of the competent organization of the United Nations, the elaboration and adoption of an international convention on the subject of extradition."

While it is recognized that topics proposed by non-governmental organizations for inclusion in the agenda of Commissions of the Economic and Social Council should be submitted considerably in advance of the first meeting of the Commission, it is respectfully requested that the draft treaty on extradition be given consideration at this session of the Social Commission in view of the fact that this important matter has been of top concern to the International Criminal Police Commission for several years.

This high personality replied to us by letter No SOA 145/1/64 DR dated April 11th 1949 that he would draw the attention of the social questions Commissions to this important problem.

Later, I addressed to Mr. CLARK, Legal Section, Division of Social Activities and to Mr. MC CALL, Chief of the Social Defence Section, a circumscribed letter of which I enclose herewith copy, tending to have taken into consideration the project in question (enclosures No 3)

President LOUIS GEORGE added an additional note to the project, of which I enclose copy, relative to the security measures with regard to mentally deficient offenders and habitual delinquents or recidivists. (Incl. No 4).

The Netherlands Ambassador presents his compliments to the Honorable the Secretary of State and has the honor to inform him that following a proposal of the Netherlands Government the 19th General Assembly of the International Criminal Police Commission will meet at The Hague. The Netherlands, on June 19, 20 and 21, 1950.

Mr. van Kleffens therefore has the honor to transmit an invitation of the Netherlands Government and the President and Secretary General of the International Criminal Police Commission to the United States Government to appoint representatives who will take part in this International Conference.

Immediately preceding the General Assembly, the International Conference for the Suppression of Counterfeit will meet on June 15, 16 and 17, 1950. This Conference will meet in accordance with Article 15 of the International Convention on Counterfeit, signed at Geneva, April 20, 1929. Already two Conferences of this kind have taken place under the auspices of the League of Nations, one in 1931 at Geneva and the other in 1935 at Copenhagen. In 1935 the League of Nations had entrusted the President of the International Criminal Police Commission with the convocations for and the organization of the conference. At the request of the General Assembly of the International Criminal Police Commission the United Nations has consented that the present conference be convoked in the same way.

The enclosed note drafted by the General Secretariat of the Commission at Paris contains further information relating to the Conference in question.

The third International Conference for the suppression
of counterfeit currency, falls within the framework of the
"International Convention for the Suppression of Counterfeit
Currency", signed at GENEVA on April 20, 1929. It is under
the auspices of the United Nations.

Its purpose is to bring together all authorities in-
terested in the fight against counterfeit currency - that
is, on the one hand, the representatives of police services
charged with combating counterfeiters and, on the other hand,
the representatives of institutions which issue paper or
metal currency, all being naturally interested in the pro-
tection of currency. These different authorities will be
called upon during this meeting to examine successively the
four main aspects of the counterfeiting question:

- juridical aspect (legislative texts for the
protection of currency on a national level and con-
ventions and agreements on an international level),

- police aspect

-police aspect (counterfeitors' tactics in the printing and passing of counterfeit currency - the arrest of counterfeit gangs),

-technical aspect (printing procedures used by counterfeiters and the technical protection of genuine currency),

-administrative aspect (coordination of preventive and suppressive action on national and international levels among authorities interested in the suppression of counterfeiting).

It is now envisaged that a report will be drawn up on each of these questions and distributed to the delegates several weeks before the conference.

The rapporteurs have been consulted.

Furthermore, delegates who desire may make reports on the question of counterfeiting, within the framework set forth above. Such reports should, with a view to translation and distribution, reach the General Secretariat of the ICSCC, II, rue des Saussaies, PARIS, before MARCH 15, 1950.

All of these reports will first be discussed by sub-committees chosen at the opening of the Plenary Session, and the rapporteurs of these subcommittees will present summaries of the papers to the Session.

The Conference, in plenary session, will thus be brought into a position to consider the problem as a whole and to adopt whatever general measures are necessary in connection with the duties of the subcommittees.

It is anticipated that the Conference will take place on June 15, 16, and 17, 1950.

Reference is made to my memorandum to the Attorney General dated January 5, 1950, explaining an appeal understandingly made by the International Criminal Police Commission to the 27th General Assembly of the United Nations on March 11, 1949, which was adopted, whereby the International Criminal Police Commission was given power, from time to time, to instruct the Attorney General "to negotiate with the Government of the United Nations, or with any other appropriate authority, the adoption of such measures as may be necessary to facilitate the execution of the International Criminal Police Commission's functions." Reference is also made to my memorandum of March 10, 1950, to the Attorney General "regarding the preparation of a draft International Convention on the subject of extradition which will be submitted to the International Criminal Police Commission at its meeting in August, 1950, in the event that the Secretary-General of the International Criminal Police Commission has instructed it to do so." Reference is also made to my memorandum of April 10, 1950, to the Attorney General of the United Nations, reporting him "to study this question with a view to ascertaining the possibility of putting on the agenda of the International Criminal Police Commission of the United Nations, the question of the adoption of an international convention on the subject of extradition."

The International Criminal Police Commission has requested the Chairman of the Social Commission to have consideration given to this matter at the present session of the Social Commission.

The above information was obtained by this Bureau in consultation with the liaison which we performed during the International Criminal Police Commission's meeting in the United Nations. It is believed that you might be interested in this matter in view of the Department's jurisdiction in questions of extradition.





GOOSSEI is on the Organization Committee of the I.C.P.C.'s 10th General Assembly scheduled for June 19-22, 1950 at The Hague. An identical communication from Mr. GOOSSEI was received by the writer. It furnished hotel accommodations at Scheveningen, Holland, for the period of the conferences and enclosed an official guide for the meetings.

The communications are intended for Mr. J. E. BAUERWILL, Chief of Secret Service and Mr. J. H. LIVINGSTON, Vice President, American Express Company, New York City. It is suggested that the envelopes be forwarded to them.

A difference is made to the statement in "Mr. LOUIS MURRAY" letter to the Director dated March 21, 1950 which indicated that Mr. RAYMOND D. HEAD, head of the Secret Service, might attend the June conference sponsored by the I.C.P.C. Messrs. DUBOURG, Secretary General of the I.C.P.C., and his assistant, Mr. JEAN DELLEZ, advised that several meetings in the I.C.P.C., in response to a request by Mr. WILLY GOOSSEI, Mr. H. H. BAUERWILL representative at this Bureau, extended an invitation to Mr. BAUERWILL to attend the coming I.C.P.C. meeting at The Hague in June. No detail of these two meetings to the "10th International Conference for the Cooperation of Countries" is given. It is understood that the purpose of the I.C.P.C. to follow the lead of the International Criminal Police Conference.

The writer tactfully expressed his ~~opposition~~ ^{disagreement} that the I.C.P.C. had not extended this invitation to BAUERWILL either in this or in the original letter that we are the sole and exclusive U.S. member of the Conference and the Federal Bureau of Investigation has no responsibility to act in liaison between the enforcement agencies of the United States and the I.C.P.C.

They indicated that the matter was an extremely delicate one for them. Mr. WHITTE confidentially advised later that they had been given to understand (possibly by SWITZER) that BRUGGSCHI prefers to have invitations sent directly to him by the IFCG. Our file seems to bear this out.

It will be noted that in PREVIOUS letter of March 27, 1950, inviting the Director to attend the June Conferences scheduled by the Commission, he advised the Director that BRUGGSCHI might attend the meetings. He did not request that an invitation be extended to BRUGGSCHI by the Bureau because, as we now know, he had already invited him by direct correspondence.

The file also contains a copy of a letter dated September 3, 1950 which was sent directly to BRUGGSCHI by PREVIOUS inviting him to attend the 18th General Assembly of the IFCG at Berne, Switzerland, last fall. Mr. GUY SPURGEON attended this conference for the "Treasury" Department.

On April 25, 1950, Mr. WHITTE handed me a copy of the provisional agenda for both the June conferences. Copies are attached. It will be noted that Item III of the Agenda for the "3rd International Conference for the Suppression of Counterfeiting" is entitled, "Police Action and Counterfeit Currency (''S. J. PREVIOUS and J. R. SPURGEON''). This specific item on the agenda supports the conclusion that his attendance will be in the nature of that of a delegate, not an observer.

PREVIOUS failure to have invitations to BRUGGSCHI cleared through the Bureau does not stem from his ignorance of the policy we have established that all such communications clear through us. He understands our position but risks our disfavor to avoid offending PREVIOUS. His action in this regard is rendered even more curious and suspicious when it is recalled that Treasury is not a member and has no official connection with the IFCG, that it pays no dues and has no power or authority whatever for joint undertakings of the IFCG members.

As the Bureau is aware, the IFCG has long been courting the Central Bank of the Congo Department. (See Telecopy Letter dated October 27, 1950, transmitting the Conference's desire to enter into direct liaison with the Central Bank of the Congo and the Minister Finance, and Letter dated June 1, 1950, quoting PREVIOUS letter to the Director in which he proposed that SWITZER and ALLEGRA be invited to the Berne Meeting in 1951.)

Whether the Bureau should continue relations with an organization which is not a member of the IFCG is a question of considerable (Russia, Hungary, Czechoslovakia and Poland) - of which is of doubtful

utility to it will be the subject of further study by the writer.

In this connection, Mr. IFPOTZ advised that according to information he has received Dr. JOSEPH CERMER of Czechoslovakia, one of the five Vice-Presidents of the Commission, is now in prison in Czechoslovakia after his arrest by the Communist controlled police about three months ago. Mr. IFPOTZ expressed his opinion that none of the above Iron Curtain countries will send delegates to the conferences in June, although he stated they will be invited.

It is recommended that the writer be designated to represent the Director at the ICPC Conferences in June.

It is also recommended that after the above conferences, the writer submit a full report of his observations at those meetings and his recommendations as to our future relations with the ICPC.






