"We must do what we do until the prophet come, bro and sis, we must live our selves day and night ready for that awful day which is coming to us. the Japanese shot India would come true, we dont know when they will go. We never tried a soldier never does his mouth open when he meets him, for we are here under our own vine and fig tree & believe where we will come at time when we will keep this temple." (approximate 10 minutes)

(10-12-34) Young boy states in meeting, recorded by I Simpson El "we also know that we are not negro, black people, colored or nubian because we are a nation and no nation cant have them many names. We have our own flag, this red flag that the King left with the 5 pointed green star in the center is our Mother Second--"

(10-12-34) Nelson Bey Grand Governor of Moorish Science Temple stated the following which was recorded by Sister Ruth Howell Bey acting secretary of the meeting.)

"Now the world is looking at 1935 for they are expecting war right after January and in 9 months they are expecting the whole world to be bottom side up down, we are here to pay our respects to the deceased Sister. I never came here to Preach a funeral, I came here to talk to the living. Noble Drew Ali said I'm going to try you to see much of your life and if you stick you are a good one, this Koran is that book of Seven Seals, every so called negro and every so called white man in Flint better get up off their stool of do Nothing and think for themself. While the so called white man is Squabbling among them selves, we the Moorish America are getting together for in 1935 its that awful day. The prophet said this government will be the last one he get to but will be the quickest finished, for it will start at midnight and be finished for breakfast. Brothers and sisters here in Flint Temple use your free Sincere let the prophet find you where he left you at, he left you in the Temple and if he dont find you there it will be too bad for you. A prophet never stays and see his work manifested, he does his work and gets on out the way. Since Noble Drew Ali gone on the scene there are all kinds of Gangsters, europeans killing one another, and sons killing their own fathers. We never persuade no ones to believe what we do. Peoples are going crazy pretty soon."

(A Chapman El stated in meeting 12-12-34 as recorded in minutes) "we must come together and creat a duty of action and act, the people on the outside is looking at the Moors, you must live the life of Moslems so the outside world can see and no you ar going this way, when you come to the table and said Rite my name I believe Noble Drew Ali is a Prophet, if your mind is satisfied that is heaven. If the breath that you breath belong to Allah and it is not your bus when he take it you live like he told you. I never saw a nation ever rising so power without having to the prophet whose in their minds is so confused that cant not reach no conclusion. The prophet said if my instruction ar not carried out the worst day will come."

() Nelson Bey, Grand Shiek stated in meeting 12-16-34,) "the government have secret servs men and we need some for the Moorish Science temple, it was nation etc. --", "you secret servs men ar to bring a report if you see any member talking the secret of this place not dispose to the police --".

Statement of Reverend Wilkerson Vaughn taken in the office of Air Plant Protection, Buick Motor Division, Flint, Michigan, November 23rd, 1942 at 3:00 p.m., in the presence of Investigators Durward W. Harrell, IBM, Frank Zeider and Detective Murray Young of the Michigan State Police, taken by Mary M. Roth.

Q. What is your name? A. Rev. Wilkerson Vaughn.

Q. What is your address? A. 3602 Maines Street, Flint, Michigan.

Q. What is your age? A. 52 yrs.

Q. What is your education?

A. Graduate of Georgia State Industrial College, Savannah, Ga.
Bachelor of Divinity.

Q. Do you have a church of your own?

A. Yes, the Golden Leaf Baptist Church, 916 Jamieson St.

Q. Around 1934, did a Japanese agent speak in your church?

A. Yes, Major Takahasi of the Japanese Army held a meeting in my church.

Q. What was the purpose of this meeting?

A. Dr. Leach spoke to my son-in-law August Turnipseed about getting the church for this meeting. My son-in-law asked me for the Church saying that he would speak in regard to the welfare of the Negro.

Q. My

Q. What did he say at this meeting?

A. He said that he wanted to organize the colored people so they could talk with us in case we needed them they would come to our rescue. He didn't expect us to fight with them in case they went to war with the United States, but he did want it so that they could talk with us in an organization, said they had the second largest navy in the world. That he asked how many people (colored) were in Flint, he wanted at least 4000 colored people in this organization, he wanted all of them, but at least 4000.

Q. How many times did he speak here?

A. He spoke once, and came the second time.

Q. What did he do the second time?

A. He said there wasn't enough folks to do what he wanted to do, so he went on to Detroit.

Q. Were any members of the Moorish Science Club at this meeting?

A. About half of the congregation at the meeting were Moorish Americans.

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Q. Were these Moorish members in their religious regalia?
A. They didn't have on their robes, they had on their turbans.

Q. Did you see Jim Nelson at this meeting.
A. Yes, I introduced Jim Nelson to Major Takahashi at Nelson's own request.

Q. Did you hear the conversation between Takahashi and Nelson?
A. Yes, the Jap didn't seem to know who Jim Nelson was.

Q. Did you see Nelson talk to the Jap the second time he was here?
A. Yes, that is when he told the Jap that his organization would love to have him come to his meeting.

Q. What did the Jap answer?
A. He didn't even answer, that I know of.

Q. What was the Japs purpose in organizing?
A. He was organizing the colored all over the world, they had men out like him all over the world to organize them, to get them in an alliance together. If the colored people need the Japanese the Japanese would come to their rescue.

Q. Did you have any other discussions with Jim Nelson in regard to this Jap?

A. Yes, sometimes later he asked me what happened to the Jap. I told Nelson that they had deported the Jap and Nelson said, they couldn't do that, because he was too good of a man.

Q. What other conversation did you have with Jim Nelson? regarding the Japanese?

A. I have heard them say many times we colored people were foolish to stick up with the white people as we were Asiatics and would some day rule the world.

Q. Did you ever hear the Moorish-American people say that the Japanese were going to take over the Buick Motor Co. and give it to the colored people.

A. I heard one of their members, his name is John Toomer, say this. Toomer was taking care of his folks, he had a lot of money and he was going around preaching this stuff to different members. He didn't get very far with preaching this stuff. He later went to another place.

A. Yes, he was at the first meeting.
