Johnson, Jim Boswell and Charlie Quick were going to do the job, and blow the Smith's up; that about four days later the Smith house was blown up. Thompson stated that Charlie Quick was from Texas, and understood he had left Osage County, and that it would be hard to make him talk; that Jim Boswell would not be so hard to make talk.

Thompson also stated that if it could be arranged to have Ernest Burkhardt arrested and brought face to face with him where an officer could overhear them, Page 453, Par. 4, he could force Ernest to confess; Thompson said "I'll just tell the s--- of a son said "I'll just tell the s--- of b----, you damn double crossing b---- of a b----, you have caused others to fall, and now you are going to get yours". You tell all about the murders or I'll tell all I know". Thompson intimated that this would force Ernest Burkhardt to confess about the murders to avoid a lot of other crimes being found out and told on him and others.

R. S. Jordan, in a statement made to Agent R. A. Street and W. H. Brackett on July 15, 1925, said that on the night Bill Smith's house was blown up, Blackie Thompson, Jim Boswell and Charlie Boswell came to Greenleaf Ranch and remained there until the next morning. They told the ranch hands that they had been hunting for a gold boy up in the mountains and had

**ROY BULL HORN**

It is alleged that Roy Bunch was intimate with Roan's wife covering a period of several months prior to Roan's murder. Bunch married Mrs. Roan shortly after Henry Roan's murder. Bunch is alleged to have remarked, when Roan's body was found, to a crowd in which Bill Hale was present, that "low they will blame that on me", meaning the murder of Henry Roan.

**Probable Conspirator**

It is alleged to have stated that he believes Henry Roan was shot by Sam Tulk and Bob Parker while they were chasing him for having liquor.

Sam Tulk is alleged to have stated to former Agent Weekly that after the discovery of Roan's body, Roy Bunch called Hale on the telephone and told Roan's widow that if any one asked her where he was the night Roan disappeared, Bunch was the man to inform them that he, Bunch, was with her at her home that night.

The consensus/opinion of Orange County is that in the "Bill" Hale was the master mind in the murder of Henry Roan, and that Junie either murdered Zenith Roan or in some manner participated in the direction of the "Bill" Hale.



She leaving about 8 A. M. in Bob Carter's taxicab; that she took with her a small handbag of personal effects, and in this bag she had a .32 calibre revolver which she usually carried; that she did not see Anna alive again; that after Anna's body was found she went with the officers and unlocked Anna's house, which was still in the same condition as on the morning of May 21 when Anna left for Grayhorse; that the beds had not been disturbed there; that the same handbag used nor was there any sign of any disturbance there; that the same handbag Anna had carried away was missing. This shows that evidently Anna or some one else had been there and left the bag; that she later heard that Frank Hickey had found a .32 calibre revolver, while on a picnic near the place where Anna's body was found. Frank Hickey, on being interviewed, denied this.

It is alleged that Mrs. Bitterly stated that Mayme Motley was the taxi driver that frequently handled Anna. It is further alleged that Mrs. Bitterly has been interviewed.

When Edith Davis was interviewed by Agent Weiss in September 1923, she denied that she ever met or knew Bryan Burkhardt, and declared she had not seen Anna Brown since Friday night before the murder (May 20, 1921), and that was at Pawhuska at which time she and Anna had quarreled and parted Anna going to Fairier and she returning to Pawhuska. (Agent Weiss noted at the time, however, that she kept laughing to herself, and was convinced she was not telling the truth).

Agents Weiss and Burger have checked and investigated the theory that Rose Osgage and Jimmy Hicks alias Joe Allen killed Anna Brown, and are convinced there is no truth to it.
