After examining this sheet of paper, DEL TUPO recalled that Mr. LIVINGSTONE, a trial juror in the KUILLIMAN case, appeared in his office on March 5, 1956, and furnished him the information reflected in the above notes concerning the hung jury.

"With respect to the notation '2 for acquittal were afraid,' DEL TUPO said the only thing he could make out of that notation at this time is he would guess that if it does mean anything it must mean that two out of the five jurors for acquittal, in addition to those other reasons which this juror explained to DEL TUPO, also weighed the possibility of something happening to them."

With regard to the notation concerning the not worth statement, DEL TUPO stated that it is his recollection that LIVINGSTONE related that the jury felt that KUILLIMAN in effect lied when he gave the not worth statement to the Government, and they did not believe the not worth statement in this case. DEL TUPO stated that if the jurors did not believe the not worth statement then they took great care in their deliberations.

With regard to the notation concerning no one proof, DEL TUPO said that what LIVINGSTONE meant by that was that the jury was not at all convinced that the Government had submitted proof of a kidney tumor which had caused KUILLIMAN to leave Government, and consequently he was not guilty.

With regard to the notation 7 - 4 - 1 conviction, DEL TUPO stated it is his recollection that this notation referred to voting by the jury and inadvertently refers to the fact that seven jurors voted for conviction, four voted for acquittal, and one juror (JUROR 11) was undecided.

With regard to the notation concerning jurors #7 and #8 (CALIXTERI and BORADIO) for acquittal, it is DEL TUPO's recollection that LIVINGSTONE merely cited the vote of these two jurors. DEL TUPO said he has the feeling that these two jurors were pushing for acquittal, but he has no specific facts or recollection in this regard.

With regard to the notation concerning Juror #8 (ANDRES), DEL TUPO stated his only recollection concerning this notation is that LIVINGSTONE told him this juror was "pushing for acquittal."

With regard to the last notation of the "recollection"  
sheet concerning O'RARA, DEL TUPO said that JOHN O'BRIEN is a  
Special Agent, Intelligence Division, Internal Revenue Service.  
DEL TUPO said that LIVINGSTON reported to him that the  
impression of the jurors was that [REDACTED] as a Government  
witness "hedged" and did not make a good impression when he, upon  
being questioned extensively by the defense, said that he did not  
not check the net worth statement and other matters relating  
thereto. It was DEL TUPO's recollection that LIVINGSTON said  
that if the Government intended to try the SWILLMAN case  
[REDACTED] the Government had better develop a little more evidence  
to buttress its case.

With regard to other trial jurors, DEL TUPO said he  
remembered Juror #9 (ALEXANDER BAKER). He said BAKER is  
assistant Vice-President, Bank of Utley, and he had felt at  
one time that the Government had a "50-50" chance with BAKER.  
In view, however, that he developed the impression that BAKER  
was not on the side of the Government in the SWILLMAN case.

DEL TUPO also recalled Juror #1 (Mrs. IRVING BOCH).  
DEL TUPO said that it seems to him that she was a kind of  
respectable person. DEL TUPO remembers that during the trial  
there was a snowstorm one day, and she got rather excited  
that she would not be able to get home.

With regard to the remaining jurors, DEL TUPO stated  
that his recollection was completely blank except that they  
were a rather nondescript group.

Concerning an article in the "Newark Evening Ledger"  
under date of March 2, 1956, to the effect that a prominent  
prison had said that the SWILLMAN jury had been promised  
for acquittal, DEL TUPO stated this prominent prison must have  
been the principal defense attorney.

DEL TUPO stated that to his knowledge no investigation  
prior was conducted by the Internal Revenue Service or any  
other type inquiry prior to securing the trial.

On February 13, 1959 USA CHESTER A. WEIDENHURNER, Newark, N.J., advised SA [REDACTED] that [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] a sealed indictment was returned by the Grand Jury charging PETER DOMINICK LA PLACA in two counts with offering and paying a bribe to LOUIS J. DONADIO, a juror at the ZWILLMAN trial in 1936, in violation of Section 206, Title 18, USC.

Mr. WEIDENHURNER further advised that on February 13, 1959, U. S. District Judge REYNIER J. WORTENDYKE, Jr., Newark, N.J., had issued a bench warrant for the arrest of PETER DOMINICK LA PLACA on the basis of the indictment and ordered bail of \$100,000 for LA PLACA.

Mr. WEIDENHURNER authorized that ANTHONY SANTO LA ROSA and LOUIS J. DONADIO be brought before Judge WORTENDYKE for posting of bail for their appearance as material witnesses under Rule 48(b), Rules of Criminal Procedure of U. S. District Court.

Affidavits were executed by SA [REDACTED] on February 13, 1959 that the testimony of LA ROSA and DONADIO was material and that it might become impracticable to secure their presence by subpoena.

During the search, miscellaneous items [REDACTED] were removed from his person. [REDACTED] were subsequently returned to LA PLACA. A receipt was obtained from LA PLACA for all property returned to him.

LA PLACA was photographed and fingerprinted at the conclusion of the search, and at 6:53 p.m., telephone privileges were made available to LA PLACA. LA PLACA made five calls, contacting his wife on one occasion. The other four occasions were efforts to locate an attorney.

At 6:46 p.m., LA PLACA was escorted to a Bureau car by [REDACTED] and transported to the office of United States Commissioner M. LESTER LYNCH, Jersey City, New Jersey.

[REDACTED] arrived at Commissioner LYNCH's office with LA PLACA at 7:10 p.m., at which time LA PLACA was placed in the custody of the United States Marshal.

At 7:47 p.m. on February 16, 1959, SAMUEL KATZ was placed under arrest by SAS [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] at his residence, 48 Collemore Terrace, West Orange, New Jersey. At the time of arrest, KATZ was advised of his right to remain silent and that any statement made by him could be used against him in a court of law. He was advised that a warrant was issued for his arrest, charging bribery of a juror in a case involving the U.S. versus ABNER ZWILLMAN, an income tax matter.

KATZ was arrested without incident and marched in the kitchen of his home and a search of the premises incidental to arrest was conducted.

The search of the premises was concluded at 8:10 p.m., February 16, 1959, and KATZ was removed from his residence and transported to the Federal Building in Newark, N. J.

After arriving in the Federal Bureau of Investigation offices in Newark, KATZ requested that he be allowed to contact his attorney. KATZ was furnished the use of a telephone, at which time he called SAM SCHIFF, his attorney, located at 1060 Broad St., Newark, N.J.

A complete search was made of KATZ' personal effects and a description of the items in his possession was recorded and a receipt for those items was obtained from KATZ when the property was released to him.

KATZ was asked if he cared to make a statement concerning his involvement in this case and he replied that he had nothing to say.

KATZ was fingerprinted and photographed in the Newark Office.

At 12:02 p.m., February 17, 1958, KATZ appeared before U.S. Commissioner W. LESLIE LYNCH of Jersey City, N.J., for arraignment. SAC Simon, Newark, called to advise me of action which he was taking [REDACTED] during the tax trial of Zwillman in 1956, took moving pictures of various persons in the corridor outside the trial room. The Assistant U. S. Attorney at Newark understood these have been [REDACTED]. The AUSA indicates he could get this film and turn it over to the Newark Office on a confidential basis if it was desired.

Under the circumstances it was not thought desirable to ask the Assistant to make any request on our behalf, nor do we have any interest in who may be in the corridors outside of the courtroom in which the Zwillman case was being tried. The implication was that by looking at the motion pictures we may be able to identify persons who might have混led through the crowds and that these persons may be involved in the alleged bribery case which Newark was handling.

There is no information or indication such activity took place. It would be highly undesirable for the FBI to be seeking such information as it is perfectly proper for persons to frequent the corridors. This is a public area and in the absence of information indicating possible illegal actions, any interest we express in these photographs or motion pictures might be construed as attempting to throttle freedom of speech.

Nothing further is being done by the Newark Office. This is for record purposes.

Investigation to date by the Newark Division has established that two jurors, LOUIS J. DONADIO and WARREN H. ANDS, were bribed. DONADIO was approached by PETER DOMINICK LA PLACA, [REDACTED] through ANTHONY S. [REDACTED], a self-employed gasoline station operator. ANDS was approached by SAMUEL "BIG SUK" KATZ, [REDACTED] brother of his brother, CHARLES L. ANDS and EDWARD A. GOODFRIEND, a member of CHARLES KATZ. DONADIO and ANDS received approximately \$1,000. each for voting for an acquittal in the SWILLMAN trial. b7c

To date the above persons have been arrested with original bail set at \$100,000. for LA PLACA, KATZ & GOODFRIEND. LA BOBA, DONADIO, CHARLES ANDS and WARREN ANDS were released on \$5,000. bond as material witnesses.

A Federal Grand Jury, Newark, N. J., has indicted KATZ, LA PLACA and GOODFRIEND for bribing and attempting to bribe of jurors in the 1956 SWILLMAN murder trial.

ZWILLMAN, among other things, is known to be the head of a vending machine company and has been described as "the kingpin boss of the New Jersey underworld" upon the arrival of prohibition in the early 1930s. He is also said to be one of the greatest and most powerful figures to ever exist in New Jersey with great influence on labor, politics and the underworld.

KATZ is known to be a truck driver for a Newark General Motors Corp. dealer, as well as an associate and chauffeur for ZWILLMAN.

LA PLACA is known to be a "bookmaker". He is reportedly a former associate of WILLIE MORETTI, a notorious gangster who was murdered in gangland style at Cliffside Park, N. J. on October 4, 1951. LA PLACA's son, DOMINICK, is married to one of MORETTI's daughters.

Investigation to date has also established that in addition to the bribes made to DONADIO and ANDS, that an approach was made to a member of the jury panel prior to the selection of the jury for the 1956 SWILLMAN trial. At this

On May 26, 1954, Zwillman was indicted by a Federal Grand Jury at Newark, New Jersey, on two counts charging that he knowingly and willfully attempted to defraud and evade income tax due and owed to the United States in violation of Title 36, United States Code, section 145 (b).

Count one charged that Zwillman and his wife in 1947 had a joint net income of \$50,043.55 upon which there was owed to the U. S. Government an income tax of \$15,000.

Count two charged that Zwillman and his wife had a joint net income of \$70,965.73 in 1948 on which they owed the U. S. an income tax of \$28,493.83.

On May 28, 1954, Zwillman entered a not guilty plea to the two-count indictment in Federal Court in Newark. The trial began in January, 1956, and continued until March 1, 1956, at which time the jury reported that it had failed to reach a decision in the case. In October, 1958, Zwillman renewed a prior motion for acquittal. This motion is still pending.

A juror was indicted in the 1960 tax evasion trial of James J. Brinkley Zwillman, known the black marketeer as "the教父 of the New Jersey underworld," the FBI charged.

On Dec. 10 yesterday at Newark Federal Court, the FBI revealed a tip of three years ago that FBI agents had paid \$100,000 to a juror to influence his attitude toward the defense's case.

The juror, identified as Robert R. Rizzo, 32, was held in a federal jail. Defendants were held on \$100,000 bail each except for James W. of 17 Lincoln Ave., held on \$5,000 bail except for his wife, Mrs. James W. DeGrazia, 30, who was held on \$1,000 bail. DeGrazia, 30, is accused of receiving \$100,000 from Zwillman to influence the jury. He is charged with conspiracy to commit mail fraud and with filing a false tax return for 1959.

The broad was agreed to make a further interview during the year and to have him appear before the grand jury between Jan. 14 and Dec. 31, 1965.

Woodstock, N.Y., is the home of DeGrazia, an untrained architect. He has a law office in Newark, and he is a member of the American Bar Association. He also owns a home in Woodstock.

DeGrazia's lawyer, Anthony J. Cimino, declined to comment on the matter.

# Bodyguard Of Gangster Held in Bribe

NEW YORK, Oct. 3 (UPI)—A former bodyguard of James J. "Whitey" Morello was arrested yesterday. He is accused of taking a bribe in the 1951 income tax evasion trial of Alvin "Lucky" Luciano, a prohibition figure.

The two men faced trial yesterday. One of them is Leo LaPlace, who is charged with receiving the bribe money; the other is a 37-year-old insurance broker whom prosecutors say the day before trial checks were held as evidence in the case.

The 1951 trial resulted in a hung jury. LaPlace, 37, and his co-defendant, the reputed Big Bull of the underworld in the Jersey City area of the New Jersey underworld, now is awaiting the federal District Court here to enter a verdict of guilty on the tax charge.

The three accused men were arrested by FBI agents from Newark, N.J., and New York, and were arraigned here yesterday. They were introduced to Washington by J. Edgar Hoover, director of the FBI.

Placed up in Highwood was Morello's former bodyguard, Peter LaPlace, 34, of West Hoboken, N.J. He is charged with giving bribe money to James Joseph Duff, 49, of the Newark firm.

The payoff amounted to United States Attorney Christopher A. Krebs' office and less than \$5,000.

Mr. Donald E. Strohman, unemployed, of 1111 Morris Ave., Wood-Ridge, N.J., was held in Newark as a witness. He is a 25-year-old operator of Anthony's Santa Fe Restaurant, 41 of Wood-Ridge. LaPlace was listed as the name of the bodyguard and chauffeur of Morello. Mr. LaPlace was absent October 4, 1951, when Morello was held to determine a Cliffside Park restaurant, reportedly for being too outspoken about underworld matters.


